## THE ALTO MAYO PROTECTED FOREST

**CI-BHP ALLIANCE** 



Located in the San Martín region of northern Peru, the Alto Mayo Protected Forest (AMPF) spans 450,000 acres — an area twice the size of New York City. This tropical forest is home to diverse plants and animals, including over 400 bird species and 300 orchid

species. The yellow-tailed woolly monkey, Peru's biggest primate, is native to the Alto Mayo Protected Forest and is critically endangered. The forest also protects streams that supply water to more than 250,000 people in the Alto Mayo basin.

## PROTECTING THE ALTO MAYO, PROVIDING ECONOMIC ALTERNATIVES

Despite its protected status, deforestation from agricultural encroachment and illegal land and timber trafficking threaten the AMPF and, in turn, the lives of families who live within and near this area and depend on forest resources.

To provide local farmers with economic alternatives

to deforestation, Conservation International (CI) creates conservation agreements with communities in exchange for direct benefits. Families in this area pledge not to cut down the trees in return for benefits such as agricultural training, improved cookstoves and educational materials.

These conservation agreements are partially funded through REDD+, a nature-based climate change solution that seeks to reduce emissions from deforestation and forest degradation.
